The addition of the Autism Centre ribbon cutting with Mayor Bob Wells. will build on the CVCDA's capacity to intervene quickly, to focus on each child's needs, and to welcome their families to spend time in the centre. to share ideas with staff and connect with other parents. It will primarily be used to house these services for children with autism and their families, but it will also be available for their other programs and for the use of community groups. The CVCDA will now have the space and equipment needed to offer services to all children.

Much of the funding needed to complete the project came through grants from the provincial government and private donors. Proceeds from the CVCDA's annual Children's Telethon are also assisting with final touches such as furnishings.
